I'd like to briefly go over two of the reports that I sent you, and then I have a couple more items that I'd 5 like to report on. For the race a day report for Ruidoso Downs, in their first 47 days they ran 168 New Mexico-bred races. This is an average of 3.57 per day. They're running 51 percent thoroughbreds and 49 percent quarter horses. Their average field size for New Mexico-bred overnight races for quarter horses is 7.08 -- I'm sorry, for thoroughbreds is 7.08. Quarter horses are 8.79. And for a combined average of 7.76. 12 So it's a little bit low there. 13 For the Downs at Albuquerque, in their first 31 days they ran 114 New Mexico-bred races. This is an average of 14 3.68 per day. They're running 63 percent thoroughbreds and 37 16 percent quarter horses, so that's great. Their thoroughbred average field size is 8.73. Their quarter horses are 9.38 for 17 a combined total of 8.97. And since I've done this report, 18 19 that number has actually come up, so that's good news. For Ruidoso Downs and their New Mexico-breds and 20 open overnight races, in their first 44 days, 391 New 21 Mexico-breds ran in overnight open races and 146 cities came in 22 23 first, second or third for an average of 37 percent. For the Downs at Albuquerque, in their first 27 24 25 days, 255 New Mexico-breds ran open and 55 of those came in

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1 ourselves and make sure that there's an understanding of the 2 purpose of the Jockeys' Guild and what we do and how we work

with the industry and the regulators for our sport and for 4 horse racing.

To give a little bit of background and history, 6 for some people in the room, this may be redundant. For others, even when I explain it to people that have been in 8 horse racing for years, it always seems to be a new thing for 9 them.

Our organization was established in 1940 by 10 leading jockeys, including Eddie Arcaro, Sam Renick, Johnny 11 12 Longden. The reason it was established is because at that time 13 there was no coverage. There was no insurance coverage for the riders. And riders began having issues and being ostracized

15 for passing the boot, if you will, when riders were hurt. Since that time, for almost 80 years, the guild 16 17 has worked to serve both the thoroughbred and quarter horse 18 riders throughout the country. Currently, we have 19 approximately 1,270 active, retired and permanently disabled 20 riders. The purpose of the guild is to provide representation and serve as a voice for the jockeys throughout the country. 22 The main goal is to protect the riders by working with the

industry and regulators to strive for a safer racing 24 environment. To obtain and provide necessary benefits for 25 these individuals as they're performing their duties as

1 else that is afforded to them while riding at racetracks here 2 in New Mexico.

The funding for our organization is based on 4 annual dues from the members, as well as \$4 or \$5 per amount depending on the racetrack where they're riding and track 5 contributions. Based on the classifications of the racetrack, depending on the average purse, the racetrack contributions

contributes to the amount based on the number of race days, as well as the number of entries per day.

10 With the tracks that we have industry partnership 11 agreements, we've entered into an agreement in which 50 percent 12 of those funds we receive are restricted for those jockeys, meaning the jockeys here in New Mexico would receive those benefits for those racetracks. For example, in addition to the 14 life insurance and AD&D, as I explained, and the supplemental 15 health and welfare benefit for items such as personal health 16 insurance for jockeys and their families, as well as the 17 18 long-term disability policies, we have provided -- for example, last year in 2018 under our agreement at that time with Sunland 19 Park, qualifying jockeys were each individually provided \$1,615 20 21 for their reimbursements. That is in addition to the other benefits that they were receiving. 22 23

Accomplishments that we have created or 24 established over the years have been great, but most of them 25 all contribute to safety and the health and welfare not only to

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Page 40

1 jockeys, as well as monitoring developments in local, state and 2 federal laws that affect the racing industry and in particular the jockeys.

Now, the benefits that we provide, as I outlined 5 and are included in the booklets that I have provided you with, 6 are life insurance, AD&D temporary disability in the event that 7 they're injured both in the morning and during on-track accidents. Supplemental healthcare reimbursements for the riders, for jockeys that qualify at contributing racetracks, which I'll briefly discuss later. Benefits and supplemental reimbursements for our permanent disabled jockeys, as well as 12 representation.

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Here in New Mexico, we represent the majority of the jockeys with approximately 85 to 90 percent thoroughbred, 15 depending on the track, and 60 percent quarter horse. Now, the 16 reason for the lower quarter horse representation, the stable 17 court horse riders that regularly ride in New Mexico are 18 members of the guild. However, because we do have a transient population coming back and forth, unfortunately, not all of those individuals are members of the guild.

However, the policies that we established, the 21 22 regulations that are provided or that are created through the 23 Commission and the benefits, with the exception of the benefits 24 that we provide directly to our members, those individual

25 jockeys are entitled to those safety precautions and everything

1 the jockeys but also the horses. Many of the proposals that 2 you'll see, some of those originated -- even though they pertain to horses, some of them actually originated with the Jockeys' Guild, because it's our strong belief that if you have safe horses, you have safe jockeys, and, in turn, safe jockeys mean you have safe horses. 6

In our industry, it's not a matter of if a jockey is going to get hurt. It's when a jockey is going to get hurt. Therefore, we feel that everybody in the industry has a responsibility to ensure that the jockeys are riding in the 10 most safe racing environment possible. 11

12 I'm going to cut out some of the concussion stuff we spoke about yesterday during the rules and medication 13 meeting, which we will present in a more formal manner after 15 further discussion with the racetracks and the rules and medication committee members. However, the goals that the 16 17 guild is continuing to work on is working with regulators through the ARCI to initially develop the model rules. I know 18 19 there's questions about the ARCI and not every rule applies to every jurisdiction exactly. However, when those rules are 20 developed, initially a rider and driver safety committee are 21 vetted before they're presented to the model rules committee. 22

23 And we receive input from industry participants both nationally and local organizations, as well as the 24 racetracks, including the racetracks and the horsemens

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1 organizations. We also work with the race day medication 2 policies. We regularly attend the International Conference of the Health and Safety and Welfare of the Jockeys. We are 4 trying to create uniformity not only here in the United States but throughout the world.

Because of being able to have the safe protocols, 6 a lot of the safety items that we're hoping to address, 8 including safety equipment, should be uniform and there shouldn't be questions whether they're riding in England versus in the U.S. of the safety equipment and safety protocols. 10

What we would ask is that once we bring rules and proposals here and we begin to develop this working 12 13 relationship with you as the regulators, that once we establish the model rules, we then bring them back to you for your review and consideration not only to assure we have the safest 15 standards but also to create some sort of uniformity, not only 16 17 for medication in horses but also for the human athletes.

One area of concern that I have been specifically 18 19 asked to address is the current status with regards to the use of the riding crops. We've seen something -- I'm sure you've all seen some of the issues arising in California, and that somehow became one of the main focal points. Although my personal opinion -- and there are individuals who argued 24 against me -- I have a very strong opinion that the riding crop 25 did not contribute or cause the injuries and the issues that

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any changes that approve the well-being of the horse, we do

believe it is important to recognize that the use of the riding crop is absolute necessity not only for safety but also for

encouragement, communication and control of the horse. This

cannot be emphasized enough. 5

It's also our belief as we as the industry, 6 including the owners, horsemen, racetrack and regulators, can reach a mutually agreed upon regulation with regards to the use of the riding crop that will be safe and humane for the horse while still allowing the riders to use it in a way that is 10 necessary for encouragement and correction. The ultimate goal 11 is to establish the standards that's in the best interests of 12 the horse, as well as the industry as a whole, including the 13 betting public, as well as the owners and the horsemen whose 14 15 lives are invested in this sport.

It would be our hope that establishing a rule similar to many of the international standards would lead to a universal riding crop usage. Such uniformity would be in the best interest of the horse, enhance the perception of our industry, and still provide fairness to the owners, the betting public, the horsemen and the jockeys. With that being said, today's current riding crop

11 However, it must be noted -- and a lot of people 12 have missed -- the CHRB's proposal that was discussed at the 13 beginning of the year has yet to begin the process for 14 legislative and for adoption by their committee. Therefore, we 15 have not been able to -- the change has not moved forward at 16 this point.

17 With that being said, during the jockey club 18 round table in Saratoga this month, the issue was brought up 19 again, at which time the jockey club made the uniform -- said 20 that they were making their recommendation to eliminate the use 21 of the riding crop but for safety purposes. I will say the 22 guild has not had a board meeting since that time, so we do not

8 years. When it was introduced, it was strongly encouraged that

the horses be subject to an inspection by a racing or official

12 When the riding crops have been used in an 13 appropriate manner, the welts and cuts have been almost completely eliminated. Any situations that have arisen since 14 then have been reported and addressed by the regulators and the 15 16 commissions as necessary.

17 The other response that they've had is just the recent introduction of the 360 GT. This is a cylinder crop. 18 It has a cylinder popper with a loud audible encouragement. 19

You know, that word "therapeutic" indicates that 4 that drug is being used to heal disease. And I know I'm not alone in talking about how drugs are not being used 6 therapeutically. They're being used to improve performance of the horses, not to heal disease, right?

So when you speak about potentially changing the way that the Commission refers to drug violations and not 10 talking about them as violations but kind of maybe mixing the language a little bit, making it sound like it was maybe a 12 little overdose or something of a therapeutic medication, at

13 least that's what it sounded to me that you were discussing. COMMISSIONER SMITH: That's not exactly true. The 14 15 therapeutical drugs are to protect the horse. For instance, Ventipulmin, it thickens the lining in the esophagus. It also 17 thickens the lining of the lungs that prevents the horse from 18 bleeding so much. Now that we don't have the use of it in Ruidoso, they use Lasix. You can't give a horse enough Lasix to keep them from bleeding out. 20

21 So therapeutical is just exactly what it says. 22 It's to prevent. Just like if your doctor prescribed something 23 to you. It's preventative. It's not a stimulant. It's not a

24 painkiller. When you've got a headache, what do you take?

25 Aspirin. Well, that's what bute and banamine are to a horse.

16 So we have to look out for the welfare of the 17 horse. I'm sure you've read this Paulick report, right? Well, 18 that's part of the problem. We're handing down penalties that we don't have to be handing down if we had the use of these 20 therapeutical drugs.
