## NEW MEXICO HORSE RACING COMMISSION MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING

I.	Call to Order and Roll Call	Meeting called to order at 9:03 a.m. by Chairman Smith. Roll call was taken and a quorum was present.	No Action Taken.
II.	Pledge of Allegiance		Pledge of Allegiance was recited.
III.	Approval of Agenda	Chairman Smith asked if there were any changes to the agenda today. There were no changes.	Motion to approve the agenda made by Commissioner Buffington. Commissioner Pitre seconded the motion. Motion passed unanimously.
IV.	Commissioners' Reports:	No comments.	No Action Taken.

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V.	Agency Director Reports:	Director Trejo thanked and commended the Commission staff for their efforts in packing and unpacking the office during recent renovations, which required staff to work remotely for a couple of weeks.  Director Trejo announced the hiring of Senior Paralegal Dominguez, noting that he has been with the Commission for one month, and praised his work and contributions thus far.  Director Trejo recognized the championship races at the Downs at Albuquerque and commended Don Cook and his staff for effectively addressing the unexpected power outage during the races and handling the situation professionally.  Director Trejo reported the recent inspection of Zia Park went very well and shared that three staff members commented the facility looks better than ever, noting the extensive renovations completion. No questions were asked.	No Action Taken.
VI.	NM Horse Breeders Association Reports:	New Mexico Horse Breeders' Association Director Barber reported that through Sunday, October 5, the Downs at Albuquerque and the New Mexico State Fair conducted 25 race days, featuring a total of 87 restricted New Mexico-bred races. Of these, there were 31 Thoroughbred overnights, 30 Quarter Horse overnights, 3	No Action Taken.

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	Thoroughbred trials, 19 Quarter Horse trials, 3 Thoroughbred stakes, and 1 Quarter Horse stake. Director Barber noted that the total contribution from the New Mexico Horse Breeders to those races was \$468,500, which is \$45,000 less than in 2024. The Downs at Albuquerque averaged 3.48 restricted New Mexico-bred races per day, consisting of 37 Thoroughbred and 50 Quarter Horse, and were plus-12 for the three-a-day requirement.  After accounting for scratched horses, the average field size for New Mexico-bred Thoroughbred overnight races was 9.42 horses per race (292 horses over 31 races). For Quarter Horses, the average field size was 9.7 horses per race (291 horses over 30 races), resulting in a combined average field size of 9.56 horses per race.  Regarding New Mexico-breds running in open overnight races and their first 25 days, 263 New Mexico-breds participated. Of these, 65 (25%) finished first, second, or third—25 Thoroughbreds and 40 Quarter Horses. The New Mexico Horse Breeders' total purse contribution for these horses was \$72,317.60.  Vice Chairman Buffington asked Director Barber how many Arizona-bred horses had joined the circuit. Director Barber responded that two Arizona-bred horses are currently eligible to compete in restricted New Mexico-bred races, beginning with the Zia Park meet.

D. Presentation by SunRay Park	Director Trejo introduced Paul Blanchard, Don Cook, and Reta Jones of Sunland Park Racetrack and Casino to give a presentation via PowerPoint regarding the possibility of the SunRay racing license being moved to a facility to be constructed in Clovis.  Mr. Blanchard discussed the positive impact of SunRay Racetrack and Casino relocation. The relocation would benefit New Mexico Horsemen, both Thoroughbred and Quarter Horse breeds, with modern sustainable facilities, superior purses, and more race days. Additionally, all New Mexicans will benefit through significantly larger gaming tax payments generated on behalf of the State's General Fund.  Mr. Blanchard continued with the following: The purpose of the presentation is to seek approval	

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	from the New Mexico Racing Commission for the relocation of SunRay racetrack, provide an	
	overview of development plan, present	
	information on the rationale, proposed site and	
	benefits, and outline steps toward implementation.	
	The Presentation included the strategic rationale	
	for relocation, the selected site (Clovis), a review of the architectural designs, discussion of	
	economic benefits, information on the project's	
	commitment to equine and environmental	
	excellence, the immediate next steps, and being	
	available for any questions and answers.	
	Strategic rationale for relocation means	
	modernized facilities to meet racing and welfare	
	standards, to strengthen long-term economic	
	sustainability, attract a larger racing customer base, enhance customer experience and	
	base, enhance customer experience and accessibility, and support the broader equine	
	industry and tourism.	
	Mr. Blanchard advised the site is located on	
	Highway 60 right on the main road and has a large	
	customer base which he submits will result in	
	larger purses for horsemen and more gaming tax	
	paid to the State of New Mexico.	
	Site location has been secured with an executed	
	purchase option. The site will have public utilities	
	and services such as police and fire. The property includes approximately 200 acres and 120 feet of	
	water rights.	
	The architectural designs of the selected location	
	have been generated by EwingCole in	

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	collaboration with New Mexico ownership and track management (DAA, SunRay) who have over 60 years of combined knowledge and experience with New Mexico Racing Commission rules and regulations. EwingCole is a nationally recognized architectural firm with extensive casino and racetrack experience and long-term knowledge of New Mexico racetrack requirements.  The presentation package showed the 200 acres with room for expansion. The first page of the presentation package was the actual map showing the location of the site on Highway 60 and its proximity to the main road through Clovis. There are 2 county roads on each end of the parcel which are paved that give access and it has large frontage on Highway 60, giving plenty of room.  The overall development and master plan on page 4 of the presentation gave an idea of the scope of the development and the location of the grandstand and the location of the casino. It also showed where the proposed barn area will be, the administration building and the future development of the hotel. On the very top right of the site will be an RV park for trainers and grooms, consisting of 40 hookups with water/sewer/electric. The park will be fenced off from the restricted area, the barn area, but licensees can come back down through county road E and back in and go through the guard shack. Page 6, the site plan, showed how the proposal for how everything will laid out, and how the	

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	properties relate to each other. Parking is very significant. The barn area will have very good access to the saddling paddock. The hotel on the left side to service the casino. Expansion areas are at the top left and around the hotel. Between the grandstand and the casino, there is proposed a very large area that will be improved and will be available for expansion.  The proposal revealed how the barn area will work, and how the area is going to look like between barns. RV parking for the trainers and grooms is visible in the layout and is advantageous for them to get back more easily but still keeps the integrity of the restricted area. Chairman Smith asked if the trailer hookups will be an unrestricted area. Mr. Blanchard stated it will be a restricted area.  Page 10 (Entertainment District) of the presentation gave an idea of the amount of parking available and how the casino and grandstand will be in close proximity, so it is easy to get from one to the other.  Page 9 showed a Typical Barn Layout Diagram.  Page 11 revealed the Grandstand Plan – Level 1. In the grandstand itself, the seating area is going to be approximately 3,000 to 3,200. Chairman Smith asked if the proposed outdoor event center and fiesta apron are going to be all grass. Mr. Blanchard answered that it is going to be a combination of grass and concrete, and it will be user-friendly.	

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	Page 12 showed the Grandstand Plan – Level 2, showing the jockey club and turf club. There will be no seating to watch the races when leaving the turf club, but patrons can stand out there to watch. The inside area will have air conditioning.  Page 13 revealed the Grandstand Plan – Level 3, showing the third floor, the announcer location, TV/photo area, the Judge's Room, and the Owner's Box.  Page 14 showed the Grandstand Lounge Section, and its elevation.  Page 15 showed the Grandstand Entrance Section, the different levels and how the line of sight will be in relation to the track rail.  Page 16 showed what the exterior elevation will look like upon completion.  The commitment to equine and environmental excellence was elaborated on by highlighting the track layout for thoroughbred and quarter horse safety and performance and designing it in accordance with NMRC rules and regulations.  Regarding the immediate next steps, Mr. Blanchard explained this is a 2-year process. As a result, the immediate next steps will be to continue the pursuit of stakeholder and local regulatory engagement, conduct soil borings, soil testing and proctor tests, obtain grading and drainage plan, and approve final architectural design plans and full construction drawings.  Mr. Blanchard welcomed any questions and feedback.	

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	Vice Chairman Buffington asked if Mr. Blanchard could provide specifics regarding the increased purse money and increased gaming tax. Mr. Blanchard estimated that the first year would be about \$12,000,000.00 million dollars for purses, a significant increase from SunRay, equating to around \$350-\$360 additional a day for purses. Vice Chairman Buffington asked how many race days would be requested. Mr. Blanchard answered approximately 32 to 34 days.  Vice Chairman Buffington asked about the time frame of when live racing would occur in Clovis. Mr. Blanchard advised it would take 2 years, and he will have to figure out if it is possible to run live racing in April or May. Mr. Blanchard added that he needs to sit down with Director Trejo and the Commission to lay it all out, and that it is a tough timeline.  Chairman Smith stated that, in the scope of things, the proposed relocation is beneficial to the horseman, beneficial to the state, as there will be more tax money and the horseman will get more live racing days. Chairman Smith added there are obligations the Commission must adhere to, including public comment. Chairman Smith deferred to Director Trejo regarding the process. Director Trejo stated there is a process to this proposed relocation, and the Commission is required to take certain steps and "mark" certain boxes for this process to be conducted, pursuant to	

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	the Commission's rules. The Commission is here	
	to ensure the rules are abided by.	
	State Senator Bill Sharer of San Juan County, in	
	attendance, asked the Commissioners if he could	
	ask a question, which was approved. Senator Sharer stated San Juan County has been the host of	
	SunRay for almost 30 years, and yet, area leaders	
	learned about the proposed relocation from	
	SunRay, not from "you", seemingly referring to	
	Mr. Blanchard and the Commission. Senator	
	Sharer asked how they can voice their opinions	
	and concerns in Clovis. Chairman Smith answered	
	for them to go to Clovis when the hearing is set.	
	Senator Sharer asked that all 120 families who are	
	going to be displaced will have to go to Clovis to	
	express that this is not a good plan. Senator Sharer	
	adds that it does not feel right to him and wants to	
	know what the steps are to be able to make a	
	presentation in Clovis or elsewhere.	
	In-House Counsel Bustamante stated for the	
	record that the proposed relocation of a racetrack	
	is dealt with in the Commission's administrative	
	Rule 15.2.1.8.J(4) NMAC. He also advised that	
	the gaming compact that the State of NM has with	
	the Native tribes, nations and pueblos also	
	recognizes the possibility of a relocation of a track,	
	and it references that the process will be handled	
	rules developed by the Racing Commission. In-	
	House Counsel Bustamante added that right now,	
	there is a 45-day comment period, for anybody to	
	submit the written comments to Senior Law Clerk	

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E. Request from SunRay Park to Relocate Racing License to Clovis	(email: David.Dominguez@rc.nm.gov), and the email address can be found on the website. All the written comments will be provided to the Commissioners and to the applicant who is proposing the relocation. Mr. Bustamante advised there would be a public hearing in Clovis. Prior to the public hearing, the 45-day comment period must end, followed by waiting an additional 15 days (by Rule) before holding the public hearing. At the public hearing, people can submit oral public comments, in person and online, and the written comments will be made part of the record. Mr. Blanchard asked to speak, which was approved. Mr. Blanchard clarified to Senator Sharer that the reason Senator Sharer did not hear from Mr. Blanchard regarding this proposal is because he was following protocol — Mr. Blanchard must go to the Commission to present before saying anything to anybody. Mr. Blanchard advised he had to submit it to the Commission to put it on the agenda. Mr. Blanchard specified that that was the only reason why he did not tell anybody about this proposal. Mr. Blanchard added he likes Farmington, and the proposed relocation has nothing to do with anything about Farmington. Rather, it has to do with the fact that SunRay is down 17 days of live racing. The current employees at SunRay will be offered the ability to work at the new proposed facility but if they do not want to move to Clovis, then that is a different	Motion for contingent approval of the relocation of SunRay Racetrack and Casino

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	situation. Mr. Blanchard added that this is strictly business.  Chairman Smith commented the presentation was really professional and impressive, but that the Commission has Rules that need to be followed.  In-House Counsel Bustamante asked if the Commission would like to entertain the following motion: Contingent approval regarding the proposed relocation of SunRay Racetrack and Casino to Clovis - contingent upon the need to follow the process to allow the public and the Native nations, tribes and pueblos to respond, and the need for a public hearing in Clovis where additional comments can be received. Only after that entire process is followed, the Commission could then entertain a final decision on the matter.	to Clovis made by Commissioner Buffington. Commissioner Pitre seconded the motion. IMO: Race Review of Licensee Gary Cross, Race # 8, Downs at Albuquerque, September 12, 2025	The Race Review is pursuant to Commission Rule 15.2.5.13(E). The NM Racing Commission heard arguments from both parties and reviewed the video several times of race #8 that ran on September 12, 2025, at the Downs at Albuquerque wherein horse #9, "Ar Ya Weegee", placed first (1st). The Downs at Albuquerque Board of Stewards ruled horse #9, "Ar Ya Weegee", dropped in approaching 3/8, pressing horse #7 inward, horse #3 clipped heels (unseated rider), horse #2 stumbled (unseated rider) and horse #10 fell. Therefore, the Downs at Albuquerque Board of Stewards disqualified horse #9, "Ar Ya Weegee" from first to unplaced.  Licensee Cross also had the opportunity to present his evidence and argument regarding the ruling of the Sunland Board of Stewards that day. The Commission also heard from other participants in the race at issue.	Motion to reverse the Downs at Albuquerque Board of Stewards' Decision made by Commissioner Buffington. Motion seconded by Commissioner Pitre. Motion passed unanimously.

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	The Commission ruled in open-session and found based upon the presentations and the review of the films, the Commission determined the #9 horse was clear of the incident that had already been developing between the #1 horse, #7 horse and #3. Accordingly, the Commission reversed the decision of the Downs at Albuquerque Board of Stewards in this matter.
